- Expansion of intra-school sporting competitions.
- After-school clubs provided by specialist coaches, in a range of sports for Y1-Y6 (and by school staff for KS2 netball & rounders).
- Provision of Forest School lessons to enhance on-site outdoor learning.

- Further enhance staff capability to deliver a PE curriculum of high quality.

- Enhance provision such that School Games award maintained at silver, progressing to gold if possible.
