## **Curriculum Developments**

The *Little Wandle* phonics scheme is proving successful in raising reading attainment in the younger classes, with considerable time and resource devoted to ensuring that its 'keep up, not catch up' approach pays dividends. A 'reading spine' has also been developed, to enable children to access regularly-changed texts of quality in their classrooms, and reading workshops have been held for junior parents to provide advice about the school's approach and ways in which parents can support their children at home.

The school's new Science scheme, introduced in September, is being enjoyed by pupils, with its increased focus on practical investigations (find out more by searching with the Twitter hashtag #HCPSsci).

In Maths, the school has embarked on the *Developing Mastery* programme, supported by the regional Maths Hub and NCETM, while continuing to provide younger children with access to *Mastering Number* sessions in Reception, Y1 and Y2 for a second year (also a Maths Hub/NCETM initiative). An enjoyable Maths Week was also recently held, with Maths shields given for achievement.





## **Christmas Celebrations**

A normal programme of Christmas shows resumed this year, with indoor performances for all year groups (Nursery with *A Song of Christmas*; Reception with *Born in a Born*; Year 1 with *The Bossy King*; Year 2 with *A Miracle in Town*; and the juniors with *I'm Going to Shine*, performed separately by Y3/5 and Y4/6, twice each, making eight performances in all). As atmospheric as last year's outdoor performances were for the junior children, we were all grateful to invite everyone inside this time, especially during the cold weather.

Other Christmas events included Santa visiting Nursery and Reception, a seasonal theatre production (*The Clockmaker's Christmas*) and lots of Christmas craft activities.









# **PTA Christmas Fayre**

Many thanks to the PTA and all who supported the Christmas Fayre, through donations, attendance or helping organise the event. An appearance by Father Christmas, live music from the choir and piano tutor Will Hay, a games room and a wide range of stalls made for a wonderful afternoon of fundraising.
