However, at this late notice there was no choice of date, and this clashes with the previously publicised date for the Junior Sports morning. ### **Pupil Councils**

They have delivered assemblies to the whole school to explain revamped dinner hall rules and the need for table manners, and have made posters to reinforce the messages which have been placed around the hall. They are also arranging a fundraiser for school: a silent disco to be held on Thursday, March 30<sup>th</sup> (following last year's enjoyable event).

### **Digital Leaders**

Our Digital Leaders have met regularly with Mrs Jones and Mrs Osholaja, and have begun assisting infant pupils with their digital skills during weekly sessions. ### **Musical Experiences**

Members of the Musical Theatre Club enjoyed an unforgettable evening when they saw a performance of *The Lion King* at the Palace Theatre in Manchester recently. The visit, organised by club lead Miss Bunning, included meeting members of the cast (Simba, Banzai and Timon) in a special after-show session – all fantastic preparation for the club's own presentation of the production in the summer term.







Another amazing arts experience awaited members of the school choir, who took part in the mammoth musical festival that is Young Voices, at the AO Arena in Manchester. Prepared for the event by Mrs Caldecott, the children enjoyed singing a range of popular songs with thousands of other school children and a professional band, including famous vocalist Heather Small. ### **CWAC School Year Consultation (Sep 2024 onwards)**

Cheshire West and Chester Council are consulting to vary the Standardised School Year. The Consultation period runs from 15 February 2023 until 3 May 2023. All feedback received during the consultation period will be considered and used to formalise any variations to the standardised school year. If the variations are adopted, the proposed implementation date will be Academic Year September 2024 and onwards. Details of this consultation can be found by clicking HERE.

Three explanatory documents have also been uploaded to the school website, on the page *Parents, Term & Holiday Dates, CWAC dates* (these comprise a covering letter, the consultation document itself, and some FAQs). Please make your views known via this public consultation.

### School uniform update

The school's uniform policy has been formalised and updated, in line with the latest DfE guidance (including gender and cost advice), and is available online HERE (website: *Information, Policies*).

Bearing in mind DfE cost guidance and the current economic climate, we have removed the requirement for any uniform to be branded (badged), although we would prefer the sweatshirt/cardigan to feature the school badge. There is no change in the uniform colours specified – please follow this guidance, and note that the school PE dress code should be followed (including that club strips are not acceptable).

The previously specified requirement regarding footwear should be observed, please - sensible, plain black shoes, not trainers or boots (except on PE days). There will be a grace period until after the Spring break before this will be monitored and any transgressions brought to parents/carers' attention.

The only immediate change we would like everyone to follow is that, while we will continue to let children come to school on PE days in their PE kit (including trainers), we would like all pupils to wear their red sweatshirt/cardigan over the top of their PE T-shirt during the school day (tracksuit tops can still be brought to school on PE days to wear for outdoor sessions, either worn over the red top for removal in class, or in a bag).

### Request for civil communication

While we recognise that parents/carers may of course have concerns at times, we would ask that all communication with the school, whether verbal or in print, recognises the need for civil communication, without threats, intimidation or antagonistic language. While the vast majority of parents recognise this, there have been instances of emails received (especially ones sent late at night) which would have benefited from a less confrontational tone. Our staff work very hard to support your children, and are always happy to speak to you to discuss issues that may arise from time to time: a face to face meeting or phone call is generally a better forum to address concerns amicably, rather than trying to tackle emotive issues via written messages. Your assistance in this is much appreciated.

### Health, Safety and Wellbeing

### Parking/Drop-off

While the drop-off system is generally working well at present, several cars have been observed stopping (or actually parking) on the roundabout near the internal gates. This is very dangerous, both for the children in the vehicle and other road users: please use the drop-off zone instead, as is intended.

We have also received communication from a local resident, concerned at the congestion and double-parking near the Co-op, and also damage to the grass verges near the layby. Please park with consideration for the local community.

In addition to the parent that I telephoned personally, I would also like to thank all those who assisted the injured cyclist outside the school last week, and everyone for managing any potential distress for their own children by shielding the scene from view and taking alternative routes. Many thanks to you all.

### **Road Safety Developments**

The accident on the roundabout immediately outside school has reinforced the need for improved safety measures in the vicinity, the need for which we have already stressed to CWAC, alongside the Parish Council's ongoing efforts. You will have noticed the recent activation, finally, of the flashing school warning signs, and the introduction of a 40mph speed limit between the current 30mph zone and Old Hall – we will continue to push for the extension of the 30mph limit itself. A further, major development that we have requested since the school's opening is scheduled for the summer break, when the A55 bridge parapets will be raised, improving the safety of this route for pedestrians.
