Key achievements to date until May 2025:

- Participation in, and success at, a wide range of inter-school fixtures and festivals (Football: Chester League Finals Day – Y4 Mixed (runners up), Y6 Mixed and Y6 Girls qualified as league winners; Y6 Sportshall Athletics – day event winners, 4th overall; District Athletics – 6th; Cross-country – District Winners (Y4 Girls).
- After-school clubs provided by specialist coaches, in a range of sports for Y1-Y6 (and by school staff for KS2 netball & rounders).
- On-site swimming pool enabled all junior classes to have additional lessons (with a focus on Y6 less able), in addition to the core offer to Y3.

Areas for further improvement and baseline evidence of need:

- Ensure curriculum PE coverage and progression are of high quality, through continued monitoring and assessment of scheme (Get Set4PE).
- Further enhance staff capability to deliver a PE curriculum of high quality.
- Further increase opportunities for intra-school competition.
- Enhance provision such that School Games award maintained at gold.
